The new multi-use field will be made available to a wide a range of activities such as pick-up soccer, picnics and gatherings, kickball, baseball catching and throwing, or a game of tag when it is not being used for MPRB programs or otherwise reserved.	

Make multi-use field an artificial turf field.	None.	This isn't feasible with available funding. The additional cost would be 500k and up. Also, artificial turf fields prohibit certain activities (like picnic gatherings) that might take place on a multi-use field.
Concerns about trees being removed. Some interest in improved paths.	Concerns expressed about trees being removed or the pathways being removed.	No trees and no paths are being removed in the concept plan. New accessible paths are planned for the new field and the existing artificial turf field.
Playground needs to be updated; new swings and all rubber surfacing	The playground needs to be updated. The equipment is getting old and sand is hard to maintain and gets stuff in it that needs to be cleaned.	MPRB will have \$355,000 available in beginning in 2023 for play area and site improvements at Stewart. Under the current Phase 1 funding the CIP is directed at master plan implementation and related work. The fields are very heavily used. The additional field will repurpose an area of the park that is often saturated with water to provide more open green space for additional activities.
Improve and program baseball fields. Expand their use to other sports or activities.	Baseball at Stewart Park is not highly used. Concerns about outside communities using the baseball field. The baseball field should be left open to other uses (soccer, dog park, school, etc).	This comment has been shared with Athletic Programs leadership and Recreation Staff. MPRB has confirmed that the ballfield is currently being reserved for baseball and for other uses at the director's discretion (based on what won't damage the field). The ballfield has been reserved on a regular basis for some soccer practices. Baseball field use was down in 2019 because of drainage problems which were fixed so that the field could re-open in 2020. With COVID, the sports reservations for all kinds of fields are still down. The ballfield is typically only reserved for Minneapolis-based teams who may host out of town teams. For example, Minneapolis Youth Baseball Association has used the field. In the past, MPRB tried not having the gate to the field locked, and the result was a lot of damage to the field (which required repair in 2019). Also, the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board accepted the field donation and renamed the field to honor Bob Casey. The SSAMP retained the field because it was donated and had the potential to be

None.	Need off-leash or dedicated dog area.	A dog park or dedicated dog area is a new amenity not indicated in the South Service Area Master Plan. This comment will be shared with MPRB Strategic Planning staff.
None.	Baseball field is used by Tony Oliva league and MPRB league and should stay. Scoreboard is not working, and field fence needs repair.	MPRB maintenance staff confirmed that the scoreboard is working. This concern will be shared with maintenance staff.
None.	Gardening for landscaping with volunteer forces is a good idea. It could also include gardens for food.	Naturalized areas on the north side of the park are indicated in the master plan, while a formal garden isn't. I've inquired with our gardeners if native flower gardens fall into that definition. A stewardship agreement with MPRB would be necessary to install and maintain them. More information will be available in the future, from our gardeners.
None.	Exercise stations (simple) like Powderhorn or fancier/more complex equipment for working out outdoors is requested.	Our current budget has a shortfall for the proposed Phase 1 improvements, so this request can't be satisfied at this time. Please look for future opportunities to share this comment on future projects.
None.	Convert the baseball outfield to a shared use field to make it multipurpose. We think that idea will save the cost of a new multi-purpose field.	This request is not in line with the approved Master Plan for the park. The basis for the decision to retain the premier ballfield primarily for baseball is based on several things: the need for a premier baseball diamonds in the south service area, the field has already been donated and constructed, the field was named to honor Bob Casey at a large expense to funding partners, the large cost to repurpose the field and construct a new premier diamond field (est. 500k and up) elsewhere in the service area, the earlier trial

Cameras outside need to be monitored inside by the park board.	None.	This request falls outside our scope but it will be passed along to MPRB staff.
Need more cameras and lights	None.	Additional cameras were added on the building in 2019. No additional cameras are currently being considered in Phase 1 improvements, since it wasn't considered one of the highest priorities and because of high estimated costs. Lighting has been reviewed with Park Police. Park Police worked with forestry to have trees trimmed to help the existing lighting to increase the light in interior park areas.
Heated benches for more winter use	None.	Due to budgeting constraints and because this is not a current standard in the park system, heated benches are not currently being considered in Phase 1 improvements.

Review need for outside electricity for events	None.	MPRB has disabled one electrical receptacle outside due to misuse. This is not currently being considered in Phase 1 improvements.
Water fountains	None.	Water fountain(s) may be considered in a future phase. Due to current funding constraints, it is not being considered in Phase 1.
Install AC in the park building	None.	This falls outside the parameters of our funding, which is aimed at outdoor improvements.
Add fencing on the park interior side	None.	Fencing along 26th will be bid as an alternate. Fencing will be bid along with the new multi-purpose field. Aside from that, additional fencing isn't included in Phase 1.
Solar lights	None.	Due to budgetary constraints solar lighting is not currently being considered in Phase 1 improvements.
